VETERANS DAY, formerly known as **Armistice Day**, was originally set as a U.S. legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, which officially took place on November 11, 1918. In legislation that was passed in 1938, November 11 was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day.'" As such, this new legal holiday honored World War I veterans.

In 1954, after having been through both World War II and the Korean War, the 83rd U.S. Congress -- at the urging of the veterans service organizations -- amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

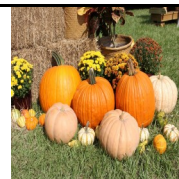

In the works:

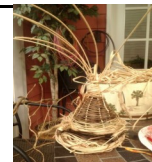
- Graveling West Delta Road. (Bayfield County Forestry Aid)

The first October meeting was held on Monday, Oct. 9th. Yeah, we're back on our 2nd and 4th Monday schedule through April. To start our gathering, a shawl and 2 other projects that came as UFO's (UnFinished Objects) were presented as finished objects. So, despite the conversation we are accomplishing our purpose of finishing those pesky projects that linger in our closets and elsewhere.

Crafts represented this day were card-making – lots of different kinds including 3-D Thanksgiving cards, Halloween cards, cards using photographs; a wool-felt sunflower wall hanging; another abstract wool-felt wall hanging; knitting a child's sweater for a world charity; knitting a scarf with variegated yarn; knitting a purple tweed sweater; and knitting dish cloths. Conversations covered crafts especially card-making with 5 people making cards in 4 different styles, WITC classes and local exercise classes. We dated ourselves by talking about old manual typewriters and party lines which all of us remembered using. The Stone Lake Cranberry Festival and the Bayfield Apple Festival were also well-covered in the conversations.

The second meeting was held on Monday, Oct. 23rd. The photo greeting cards were still being worked on, 2 sweaters were being knitted, and a cell-phone case was being crocheted. It was a smaller group due to doctor appointments and some of our snowbirds having left for warmer climate. Someone brought a 'ship in a bottle' which her husband had made. This was greatly admired and wondered over to think about how it is done. Conversation was still lively and touched on traveling south – what hotel chains are good to stop at, traveling with pets, timing of the trip to avoid high traffic times and the first snowfalls if desired. Several people said that if you get to the Tampa area you should stop at the Homosassa Florida State Park. It is 'amazing' with the manatee refuge and other great native animals to see. This reminded one person that she had seen a pair of cougar cubs near Drummond while on her ATV. She saw them clearly enough that there was no mistake. So watch for them if you're out that way.

Our November gatherings are on Monday, Nov. 13th and Monday, Nov. 27th. We meet at 1:30 P.M. at the Barnes Town Hall. It is very informal - no meeting, no hosting, just a gathering of fellow crafters with UFO's, and some without who just come to enjoy some time away to sit and chat. 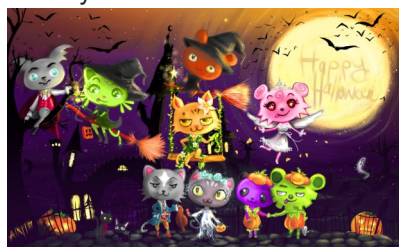

Lakes Forum Explores Pollution by Large Scale Livestock Organizations and Shoreland Zoning Rule Changes

More than 40 clean lake advocates attended at the annual meeting of the Bayfield County Lakes Forum (BCLF) held in Drummond October 7. They were updated during an open discussion on the threat of large-scale concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFOs) to the surface and ground waters of Bayfield County and how this could affect water quality, waterfront property values and public health.

In addition, they were updated about county and state shoreline zoning regulations to protect lake water quality and efforts to regain local control.

The Friends of the Eau Claire Lakes is a participating member of BCLF and sent representatives to the meeting. Mary Dougherty, a leading advocate for responsible regulation of CAFOs offered an overview of the issue and the county's efforts to create effective policies that encourage responsible agricultural endeavors without sacrificing quality of life or creating a public health hazard. Following the conversation, the BCLF unanimously passed a resolution commending the Bayfield County Supervisors for their proactive approach to this issue and calling for them to create "a public health ordinance that requires large-scale swine and poultry operations to develop and implement a plan to monitor and contain influenza and other viral disease outbreaks."

John Richter, Director of the Wisconsin Shoreland Initiative outlined WSI's effort to return local control of shoreland zoning regulation to the zoning departments of Wisconsin's 72 counties. Two years ago, Act 55 removed local control of waterfront development regulation, eliminating many of the rules that protect water quality important to over 10,000 lakes in the northern tiers of counties. Richter, a waterfront homeowner from Vilas County, emphasized the need for conservation organizations and lake associations to participate in WSI's effort to minimize damage done by the changes made by the State

Legislature's recent pro-development actions. Jennifer Croonberg-Murphy from Bayfield County Planning & Zoning Department explained specifics regarding the changes in shoreland zoning regulations caused by Act 55 and other legislation, stating that Bayfield County will seek input from lake associations and others to develop new policies regarding zoning rules for waterfront development. BCLF has formed a committee to provide input to the County Board as this new language is developed.

Group discussion then turned to a bill now being considered by the legislature that would allow developers to fill non-federal wetlands without permit or oversight and another attempt to allow developers to substantially dredge public lakebeds without DNR consent or knowledge, actions highly detrimental to water quality and habitat.

Senator Janet Bewley (D-Mason) pointed out the need for citizens, local town boards, and conservation organizations to voice their opinions on both CAFOs and local control of shoreland zoning. Bewley emphasized that the legislature needs to hear that the northern counties stand together on these issues.

The Bayfield County Lakes Forum is a citizen-volunteer organization representing 22 lake organizations and over 3,000 waterfront owners. It is not supported by or part of the Bayfield County government.

Exciting Changes in the Works at Tomahawk Lake Park

You can be a part of the transformation of Tomahawk Lake Park – Barnes' only waterfront public park!

The Town received a \$50,000 DNR Stewardship Grant to implement recommendations in the Comprehensive Land Use Plan approved by the town's Parks & Recreation Committee. Stewardship Grants require a 1:1 match from the grant applicant. Several partners like Bayfield County, the Eau Claire Lakes Conservation Club, and a handful of Friends of Tomahawk Lake Park founders have already laid the foundation, including contributing some cash and volunteer match. Our long-range vision includes growing the capacity of the Friends of Tomahawk Lake Park group to take on volunteer responsibility for the trail and facilities.



The following are core activities of the grant project:

- Expand the distance and width of the non-motorized recreational trail to allow for skate skiing, snowshoeing, and more space for folks to recreate year-round. A portion of classic-only trail will remain to minimize recreational conflict, and approximately 5km of additional trail will be expanded into Bayfield County land.
- Construct a multi-purpose, year-round park facility to serve as a warming hut, changing building, and safety shelter that is available for community events. The facility will have electricity, a well with outdoor water source, and wood heat.
- Create an interpretive nature trail highlighting local history, including the St. Croix Trail and a nearby logging camp, and animals and their habitats. The signs will be dual-purpose serving as navigation markers and educational tools.
- Improve fishing habitat and angling opportunities with fish sticks and a fishing pier south of the boat landing in the small bay. Trees harvested on town land for the ski trail expansion will be repurposed as fish sticks clusters in the bay.

Citizen donations of time and funding will help make the project a success and the park a community gem, and soon another donation option will be in place! The Town is setting up a brokerage account so donors can gift stock, which will count as a charitable donation and tax deduction. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS KIT FOR YOUR PETS

One never knows when the next natural disaster may strike. These events can be traumatic for your pets as well. As seen with any disaster we've witnessed, pets are MANY times, if not MOST often times, left behind to fend for themselves. (This of course is gut retching to me)

Some basic items to consider for your kit are:

- ◆ Food and Water for at least five days for each pet. People need at least one gallon of water per person per day. While your pet might not need that much, keep an extra gallon or two to use for your pet in case it is exposed to chemical or flood waters and needs to be rinsed.
- ◆ Bowls and a manual can opener if you are packing canned pet food
- ◆ Medications and medical records stored in a water-proof container and a first-aid kit. A pet first-aid book is also a good idea.
- ◆ Cat litter box, litter, litter scoop and bags to collect waste
- ◆ Sturdy leashes, harnesses and carriers to transport pets safely and to ensure that your pets can't escape. Carriers should be large enough to allow your pet to stand comfortably, turn around and lie down (your pet may have to stay in a carrier for hours at a time)
- ◆ Be sure to have a secure cage with no loose objects inside it. You'll need to accommodate your pet with blankets or towels for bedding and warmth as well as special items.
- ◆ Make sure your dog or cat is wearing a collar and ID tags that are up to date and visible at all times.
- ◆ You should have a chip inserted into your pets nape for locating and bringing them home. Your vet can do this at any time, and it's a good convenient time to do so when your pet is getting spayed/neutered or in for his/her shots. It's not expensive and it can bring your baby home to you. Any cost is worth that !! (if it's not, you probably shouldn't have a pet)
- ◆ Keep current photos of your pets with you, as well as a description of your pets to help others identify them in case you are separated and to prove they are yours once you're reunited.
- ◆ Written information about your pets feeding schedules, medical conditions and behavior issues along with the name and number of your veterinarian in case you have to board your pets or place them in foster care.
- ◆ Consider packing other items such as paper towels, newspapers, plastic trash bags, grooming items, pet toys and treats.
- ◆ In the confusion of an emergency, pets are too many times left behind. Find at least two responsible friends or relatives who agree to serve as temporary caregiver in the event something unexpected happens. Carry a wallet "alert card" that lists the names and phone numbers of your emergency care givers.
- ◆ Post removable "In case of Emergency" notices on your doors specifying how many pets you have and what they are. (If you donate to the ASPCA or other organizations removable stickers are easily obtained. Check with your local Humane Society as well.)

NOW THAT THE "FLEA AND TICK" SEASON IS OVER (so to speak) it's time to think about keeping your pet WARM AND SAFE for the winter months !!!!

1. The cold and ice is coming. With putting ice melt on your steps, walkways and driveways, make sure to use salt products that are "PET SAFE."
2. The cold can reek havoc on your pets paws! When walking the snow and ice can actually burn them. If it's below 10 degrees please make sure they aren't out too long or have boots on. You can get boots at local pet supply stores, Vet supply stores or pet pharmacies. (Foster & Smith, Pet's Mart, Pet Depot)

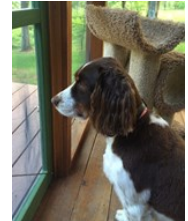

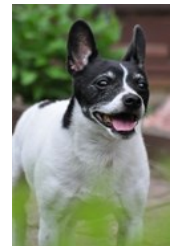

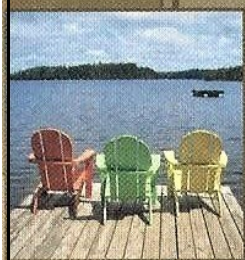

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THIS MONTH IN HISTORY—NOVEMBER

November 4, 1862 - Richard Gatling patented his first rapid-fire machine-gun which used revolving barrels rotating around a central mechanism to load, fire, and extract the cartridges

November 4, 1916 - Famed TV journalist Walter Cronkite was born in St. Joseph, Missouri. He was a leading correspondent for United Press International during World War II. From 1962 to 1981, he was the anchorman of the CBS Evening News and was widely regarded as America's most trusted journalist.

Birthday - Polish chemist Marie "Madam" Curie (1867-1934) was born in Warsaw, Poland. In 1903, she and her husband received the Nobel Prize for physics for their discovery of the element Radium.

November 9, 1872 - The Great Boston Fire started in a dry-goods warehouse then spread rapidly in windy weather, destroying nearly 800 buildings. Damage was estimated at more than \$75 million. The fire's bright red glare could be seen in the sky for nearly 100 miles.

November 10, 1775 - The U.S. Marine Corps was established as part of the U.S. Navy. It became a separate unit on July 11, 1789.

November 11, 1938 - Irving Berlin's *God Bless America* was first performed. He had written the song especially for radio entertainer Kate Smith who sang it during her regular radio broadcast. It soon became a patriotic favorite of Americans and was one of Smith's most requested songs.

November 11, 1918 - At 5 a.m., in Marshal Foch's railway car in the Forest of Compiègne, the Armistice between the Allied and Central Powers was signed, silencing the guns of World War I effective at 11 a.m. – the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. In many places in Europe, a moment of silence in memory of the millions of fallen soldiers is still observed.

November 12, 1867 - A major eruption of Mount Vesuvius in Italy began, lasting several months.

November 18, 1477 - William Caxton printed the first book in the English language, *The Dictes and Sayengis of the Phylosophers*.

November 19, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln delivered the Gettysburg Address during ceremonies dedicating 17 acres of the Gettysburg Battlefield as a National Cemetery. Famed orator Edward Everett of Massachusetts preceded Lincoln and spoke for two hours. Lincoln then delivered his address in less than two minutes. Although many in attendance were at first unimpressed, Lincoln's words have come to symbolize the definition of democracy itself.

November 19, 1978 - The biggest mass suicide in history occurred as Reverend Jim Jones led over 900 followers to their deaths at Jonestown, Guyana. Members of his "Peoples Temple" religious cult were ordered to drink a cyanide-laced fruit drink. Those who refused were forcibly injected. Precipitating the tragedy, a day earlier, California Congressman Leo J. Ryan, along with four associates and several reporters, had been shot to death during an ambush at a nearby airstrip. They were attempting to return home after investigating the cult's remote jungle location. Jones and his mistress killed themselves after watching his entire membership die. Only a few cult members managed to escape.

Birthday - American astronomer Edwin Hubble (1889-1953) was born in Marshfield, Missouri. He pioneered the concept of an expanding universe. The Hubble Space Telescope was named in his honor. It was deployed from the Space Shuttle Discovery in 1990, allowing astronomers to see farther into space than they had ever seen from telescopes on Earth.

November 22, 1963 - At 12:30 p.m., on Elm Street in downtown Dallas, President John F. Kennedy's motorcade slowly approached a tripleunderpass. Shots rang out. The President was struck in the back, then in the head. He was rushed to Parkland Memorial Hospital where fifteen doctors tried to save him. At 1 p.m., John Fitzgerald Kennedy, 35th President of the United States, was pronounced dead. On board Air Force One, at 2:38 p.m., Lyndon B. Johnson was sworn in as the 36th President.

Birthday - Wild West outlaw Billy the Kid (1859-1881) was born in New York City (probably as Henry McCarty, better known as William H. Bonney). He was a ruthless killer who escaped from jail and a sentence of hanging at age 21. He was recaptured at Stinking Springs, New Mexico, but escaped again. At Fort Sumner, on the night of July 14, 1881, he reportedly asked, "Who's there?" only to be shot twice through the heart by Sheriff Pat Garrett.

Birthday - Horror film actor Boris Karloff (1887-1969) was born in London (as William Henry Pratt). Best known for appearing in the title role in *Frankenstein* and *The Bride of Frankenstein*. He is also very well known as the voice of "The Grinch" animated series which was first aired in 1966.

November 26, 1703 - A "Great Storm" lasting two days struck southern England, flooding the Thames and Severn Rivers, killing at least 8,000 persons.

November 27, 1701 - Anders Celsius (1701-1744) was born in Sweden. He invented the centigrade (Celsius) temperature scale commonly used in Europe.

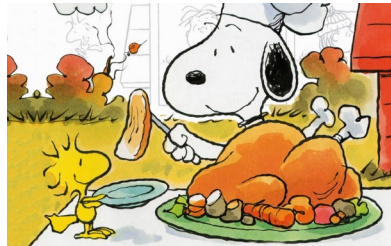

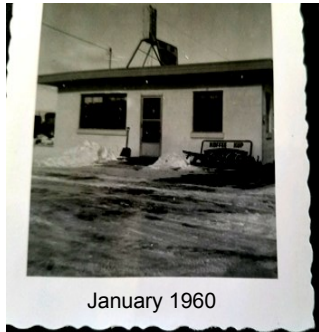

NOVEMBER REMINISCING: *the KOFFEE KUP*

By: Julie (Frierhood) Sarkauskas daughter of (Bill & Joyce Frierhood); Lonelle ("Susie" Witowich) Yarbrough daughter of (Pat (Frierhood) & Paul Witowich) and Gregg Frierhood son of (Jerry & Viola Frierhood)

It's really hard to accept that so much time has gone by, and what you grew up with is so hard to remember. I wasn't even born yet when the Koffee Kup (what is now Maki's) was built. The original building went up in 1957 / 1958. At that time it was only one story. The 2nd story wasn't added until later in 1961/1962 and was used as a residence, as it still is today.

Owners through the years: Pat (Frierhood) & Paul Witowich; Pat and Gus Dahlberg, (Pat and Paul divorced, and Pat still owned the Koffee Kup when she married Gus) Jerry & Viola Frierhood; Evelyn Hanson (leased); "Mel" Petry (sold to Mel); June Everts, (leased); Tom Whamsley (purchased from Jerry and Viola) and Stan & Phyllis Maki (purchased from Tom Whamsley).

Jerry and Viola bought the Koffee Kup from Pat and Gus in 1973. Auntie Pat's daughter Lonelle (Susie), Mom (Joyce) my sisters Shirley and Debbie and I all worked at the Koffee Kup. Along with my Dad and Jerry, our cousin Randy (Pat's son), my brothers Gary, Rick, Jack and Bill and Viola and Gregg all worked at the service station / Arctic Cat dealership next door. (the station and dealership was showcased in the May issue of Barnes Notes and News). Our Grandmother, Blanche (Pease) Frierhood also worked at the Koffee Kup when we needed extra help. Blanche was known as "Gram" to all of us, and was the daughter of Laura and Lucius Pease. (Laura was married to Lucius when he started the "Pease Resort" in April of 1916. The 100th anniversary of the resort was celebrated in August of 2016).

We were open 7 days a week, year-round, with the exception of closing a little early on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve, and being closed on Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Back in the day, we made countless, enormous amounts of donuts both plain and sugared. These were made from two recipes. Pat's you didn't have to refrigerate overnight, but Blanche's you did. To this day, our families still make them.

You've most likely noticed the tiny little house and garage behind the restaurant. The house belonged to Blanche. It was built before the service station and the Koffee Kup went up. All 4 of Blanches children were grown when she built the house built in 1945. All were gone or married except Jerry, who lived in the garage upstairs apartment next to Blanches house as there was only one bedroom in her house. The garage was built in 1947 and when Jerry and Viola were married they lived in the garage apartment for a time until they moved into a house trailer behind the station. They built a home in same spot as the trailer in 1962. The house was then moved across County Highway N 1975 where it still stands today.

The Koffee Kup SKI Team existed in the early 1980's. Folks came to ski the Birkebeiner under the Koffee Kup name. I was already gone from the area by then, and actually wasn't even aware this was part of the long standing, very popular race until sitting with Gregg recently.



FAMILY MEMORIES of the KOFFEE KUP:

** **Lonelle (Susie) Witowich Yarbrough (Pat's daughter) remembers:**

A hunting story comes to mind. Mom and Gram never got much sleep for that week. Pies, cookies, donuts plus the food and we were open early morning to late at night for the "sea of red and orange." (Many of you may remember that red was acceptable in those days for hunting clothes.)

Anyway, gallons and gallons of chili were made along with 2 turkeys for Thanksgiving dinner. Not to mention the gazillion hamburgers and everything else. Being pretty much the only game in town, everyone, including the game wardens ate there. One year the whole gang of them finished their lunch and huddled outside for a bit, then came back in and wanted to talk to Mom. Two wardens asked her where she got the venison for her chili and said it was illegal for her to serve it and they could arrest her. She flipped out! She asked "where (expletive) would she get any venison because no one in the family had time to hunt and hunters weren't giving theirs up, and who in the (expletive) had time to dress out a deer!" Then she produced receipts for two trips to the meat market in Iron River for almost 130 pounds of hamburger just for that week!

They finally backed off, and once SHE cooled off, she decided it was a testimonial to her recipe that it tasted THAT good! I guess I remember it so clearly because I had never seen my mom so mad!

Summertime it was pies that kept the oven going non-stop. Sometimes over a dozen a day and then the hot grease for 2-3 batches of donuts. My mom's recipe didn't call for dough sitting overnight. People always wanted berry pies which meant we had to find the patches then and pick them. No commercial purchases for berries. Way back then, you could get two hamburgers, French fries and a milkshake for \$1.00. Pie was another \$.25.

Once the summer people were gone we still had the local regulars. One gentleman in town always told me to keep my grades up and he would buy my graduation dress. Sure enough, when he saw my name and picture in the paper as valedictorian, he gave me money and said to buy a dress. So, I did. All of \$ 20. It was at that point that Mom married Gus and sold the restaurant to Jerry and Viola.

Susie's memories continued:

I remember Mr. W.R. Ford and his estate would eventually become "Potawatomi Estates." Mr. Ford and his guests would play golf on his private course and then come to the Koffee Kup for milk shakes. He called it his 19th hole.

My Memories Julie (Frierhood) Sarkauskas - We sure had a lot of great times at the good ol Koffee Kup. Susie Senske and I worked Saturday and Sunday mornings. I worked with mom on Sundays and Susie worked with Ester on Saturdays. During hunting season, we both worked both mornings because it was so busy. Just as when "the older ones" LOL, (sorry ladies) just as when they worked, we were open at 5:00 and didn't close until late to accommodate the hunters. The donuts, pies, cookies and coffee...OH! THE NUMBER OF POTS OF COFFEE that were made. We couldn't keep it going fast enough, we'd run out before we could get another pot to brew. I think our prices may have been a bit more for a burger and fries and a piece of pie than the years before, but not much!

Another part of working there that I think about all the time is Christmas Eve. Viola owned the restaurant at that time (she also worked there when needed and added time making pies, etc.) and I'm sure the same thing happened when Pat owned it, we would close early that day and have a little Christmas party and gift exchange. What a great way to get ready for Santa!!!!

(Yes Virginia, there is a Santa Claus)

Pizza Burgers! I've never met a match to the pizza burgers we had at that time. I can't remember where they were ordered from, and I have no idea if they could be found today but these were burgers with a seasoning that hasn't been matched, with the cheese and sauce inside the burger. When Susie and I were younger, we'd had pizza burgers and Charlie Brown's. Who remembers what those are? (coke and 7-up combined)

There are so many stories to tell, and not enough space and time. A couple more are:

- Willie Segurson (a gentleman farmer from Drummond) would come in and he always wanted "panny cakes and pork sausages."
- We made bazillions of milk shakes. One family from Joliet would come up for 3 weeks at a time every July and come in for milk shakes a lot while up here. The one I had a crush on would always get strawberry. We made milk shakes as much as we made coffee!
- Mom invented the Barnes Burger. It was a California burger with Thousand Island dressing and cheese. She LOVED "sloppy" burgers. And they were definitely sloppy!

I could go on and on as the stories come out of the wood work and once you start thinking about it they are endless.

****Fun memories from Deb (Pease) Rowe:** "Very fun place to work. Busy year round, dozens of donuts and pies, soups galore and the same repeat customers both local and from a far.

"Debbie (meaning Debbie Frierhood) and I waitressed, along with Ginny, Nancy Hunter, and whoever would cook. One morning I showed up for work and there was Debbie, but no regular cook! We just looked at each other with big eyes...who was going to cook?! After a few stunned minutes, I said "Well, I'll try it." Holy cow, what a first shift! We got the all important donuts fried and then figured out a couple pies. The morning wasn't jam-packed with customers, thank goodness. Talk about trial by fire! Fortunately, I'd previously helped clean the grill so I knew how it worked. (There were no commercial grills in the Home-Ec. room at the high school!) Some of those first meals weren't my best, but the regular customers knew they were experiencing a "newby" at the grill and didn't complain. Debbie totally backed me up. Bless her heart. I never knew if that schedule was done in error or on purpose, but since we survived we were scheduled like that a few more times. "

I loved working with Joyce Friermood, Doris Thilmont, Sharon Thayer, Merle Shaver, Ann Klein, Nancy Hunter, Larry and June Everts, Viola Friermood, Roger and Evie Hanson, Phyllis & Stan Maki and Bobby Moncel. Some of my happiest days were spent working at the Koffee Kup."

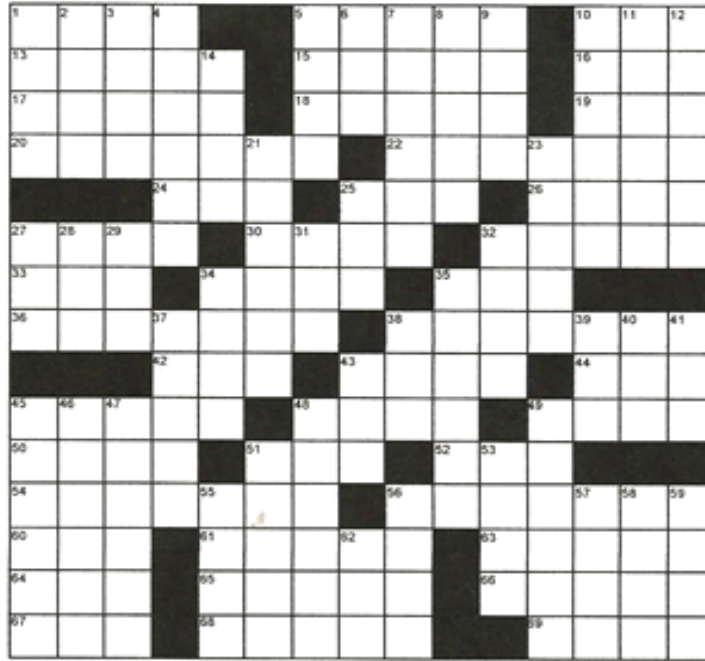

The Spice Corner: ROASTING CHESTNUTS

There's very little that warms the heart as much as the thought of the old days when chestnuts were roasting and the smell of turkey and pies baking filled the house for a whole day. Here are some tips and tricks for roasting chestnuts whether to add to the dressing or just to snack on.



Chestnuts are often thought of during Christmas time as a treat. A popular Christmas song refers to them being roasted over an open fire. They are not usually a common ingredient the rest of the year. However, there are ways to enjoy chestnuts at any time provided they are chosen, stored and prepared correctly. Although referred to as a nut because of the hard shell, they have more of a soft, grainy texture inside as opposed to being hard and crunchy like nuts.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 to 2 pounds whole chestnuts in shell
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil
- 1/4 cup water

Special Equipment

A chestnut knife (optional); a large heavy skillet (preferably cast-iron) with a lid

Directions:

Make a large X in each chestnut with chestnut knife or a sharp paring knife, cutting through shell. Toss chestnuts with oil in a bowl.

Heat dry skillet over moderately low heat until hot, then roast chestnuts in skillet on stovetop, covered, stirring every few minutes, for 15 minutes total.

Add water and continue to roast, covered, stirring occasionally, until water is evaporated and chestnuts are tender, about 5 minutes more. Serve hot.

Makes 8 – 10 Servings

CINNAMON-APPLE PORK CHOPS:

From: Taste of Home—Diabetes Issue

Ingredients:

- 2 Tbsp reduced fat butter, divided
- 4 boneless pork loin chops (4 ounces each)
- 3 Tbsp brown sugar
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 4 medium tart apples, thinly sliced
- 2 Tbsp chopped pecans



Directions:

1. In large skillet, heat 1 Tbsp butter over medium heat. Add pork chops; cook 4-5 minutes on each side or until a thermometer reads 145 degrees. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, mix brown sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt.
2. Remove chops, keep warm. Add apples, pecans, brown sugar mixture and remaining butter to pan; cook and stir until apples are tender. Serve with chops.

Make 4 servings.

BAKED WILD RICE CASSEROLE:

From: Mary Kahn (Barnes Homemakers Cookbook)

Ingredients:

- 1 cup wild rice
- 1 cup cheese (grated)
- 1 cup tomatoes (canned)
- 1 cup mushrooms (fresh or canned)
- 1/2 cup onions (chopped)
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1 cup hot water
- Salt and pepper (to taste)



Directions:

- Wash wild rice very thoroughly. Cover generously with water and let soak overnight.
- Drain rice and combine with all ingredients listed above. Reserve a little cheese for top garnish later. Use an ungreased casserole.
- Coer casserole with a foil lid and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.
- Uncover and sprinkle the remaining cheese on top.
- Heat at same temperature long enough to melt the cheese.

Should the casserole seem dry, add a small amount of water. If it is too moist, let bake uncovered a little longer before adding cheese.

The rate of absorption in rice may vary.

Make 6 - 8 servings.

- 2 cups non-dairy creamer
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup instant coffee granules
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 2 tsp nutmeg

Directions:

Blend together all ingredients and place in an airtight container, decorative jar, etc.

Include these instructions with your gift:

"For a single serving, place 2 tablespoons of mix in a mug, add one cup hot water and stir. Garnish with whipped Cream and a sprinkling of nutmeg or cinnamon."

Give this mix as part of a gift bag with some chocolate-covered spoons or Cinnamon sticks, freshly grated nutmeg and a can of whipped Cream.



SOUR CREAM RAISIN BARS

From: Aunt Arlene (Mom's sister)

Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 2 cups quick oats
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1/8 tsp salt

Filling:

- 4 egg yolks
- 2 cups sour cream
- 1 1/2 cups raisins
- 1 Tbls corn starch

Directions:

- Cream butter and sugar. Beat in flour, oats, baking powder, baking soda and salt. (Mixture will be crumbly). Set aside 2 cups.
- Pat remaining crumbs in a greased 13 x 1 x 2 pan.
- Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Cool.
- Combine filling ingredients in a sauce pan. Bring to a boil. Cook and stir constantly for 5 minutes.
- Pour over crust. Sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Bake 15 minutes.



HAM & CHEESE EGG MUFFINS

Ingredients:

- 1 dozen eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup diced ham



Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray muffin tin with non-stick cooking spray.
- In large mixing bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, salt and pepper. Stir in cheese and ham.
- Pour mixture into 12 muffin cups.
- Bake for 25 minutes or until muffins are set in the middle.

CRANBERRY SALSA

Ingredients:

- 12 ounces cranberries
- 1/4 cup sliced green onions
- 2 jalapeños, minced
- 1/4 cup fresh cilantro leaves, minced
- 2 tablespoons finely grated fresh ginger
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 cup sugar

Instructions:

Rinse, drain, and pick over cranberries, (discarding all that are soft or bruised). Place cranberries in a food processor or blender; pulse until finely chopped but not mushy.

Place crushed cranberries in a bowl; mix together with green onions, jalapeños, cilantro leaves, and ginger. Pour lemon juice and sugar over and stir together.

Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate to allow flavors to develop. It will be a bit tart to begin with, but as it is allowed to sit it will develop even more flavor.

Can be served as a plain salsa, but is amazing served over cream cheese with crackers.

COOKING TIPS:

This recipe calls for fresh ginger. When using ginger, it is easiest to cut off any knarled spots before peeling. Once peeled you can grate it easily on a hand grater. Once it gets down to a nubbin of stringiness just toss the stringy mess away.

Homemade tortilla chips are a breeze to make and are just like those ones you get at great Mexican restaurants. Just cut up corn tortillas into 6 wedges. Fry them in some vegetable oil for about 2 minutes until they harden up. Remove and drain on paper towels and salt immediately.

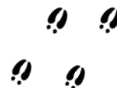
